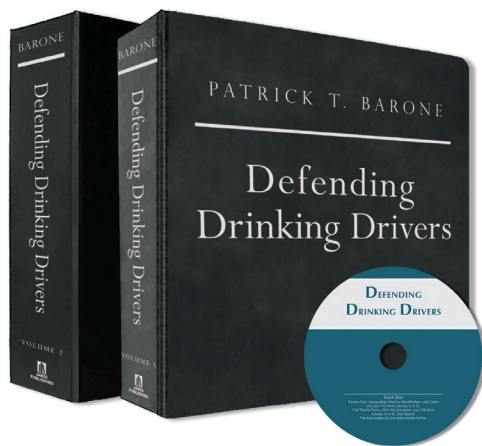

KEEP PROSECUTORS OFF BALANCE

ATTACKING EXPERTS

"Get the prosecution experts to explain to the jury how smart they are by having them explain their testimony, then follow-up with more explanatory—but targeted—questions. Soon, by and through their explanations, they will lose the jurors. With any luck, they will also lose the judge. After they've done a lot of explaining, consider making the following points in your closing argument...."

ATTACKING DESCRIPTION OF APPEARANCE

"The best way to attack this parade of horrors is to break the officer's testimony down into its component parts. Focus on each of the alleged symptoms of intoxication. Ask one or two pointed questions aimed at the validity of the observation, and then move on to the next topic. For example...."

USING METAPHORS AND ANALOGIES

"Your cross-examination questions should be formulated in such a way that the witness will be willing, if not actually forced, to agree with the specific analogy you select. The best place to look when starting to develop these analogies is the jury instructions. The terms and phrases in the instructions should become standard parts of your trial lexicon, and when addressing the jury you should think of more favorable ways to express these legal concepts. For example...."
